Etymology. The word "elephant" is based on the Latin *elephas* (genitive *elephantis*) ("elephant"), which is the Latinised form of the Greek *ἑλέφας* (*elephas*) (genitive *ἑλεφαντός*, *elephantos*), probably from a non-Indo-European language, likely Phoenician. It is attested in Mycenaean Greek as *e-re-pa* (genitive *e-re-pa-to*) in Linear B syllabic script.
